### Extended Essay Guidelines 2012

Guidelines for the Extended Essay 2012-2013 All studentstaking an option course (Paper 4 in the Regulations for MSc Economics) in the Dept of Economics are required to submit an extended essay (a "dissertation"); maximum length 6,000 words. The extended essay will generally be linked to the student's option paper (Paper 4 in the regulations) and count for half of the marks in that paper.

### Extended Essays - London School of Economics

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- Because otherwise a student will not get the diploma without submitting the extended essay. The extended essay IB word count is approximately 4,000 words. The essay should be written on a more or less narrow topic that is expected to be thoroughly investigated. For an extended essay, a student can get a grade ranging from 0 to 36 points.

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However for all essays the body be evaluated based on 1) your approach to the research question, 2) your analysis and interpretation of evidence, including critical analysis and evaluation of sources, and 3) your own argument and evaluation of this argument. You must convincingly answer the research question and argue for your thesis, presenting evidence to support your arguments.

The extended essay is an independent, self-directed piece of research, finishing with a 4,000-word paper. One component of the International Baccalaureate® (IB) Diploma Programme (DP) core, the extended essay is mandatory for all students. Read about the extended essay in greater detail.
